The autumn semester is almost over. Despite our hopes we had not been able to shift the central library to the new library building, A16. Some adjustments within the building had to be executed. However, we utilized the semester to analyze library statistics to obtain a better understanding of users' behavior and needs. This issue of the newsletter is therefore dedicated to statistics. Circulation of course text and reference books was started in the satellite library on North campus in August 2019. It turned out that the number of books checked out in the satellite is higher than the respective number on South campus. We further looked in more detail into the checkout data and related them to student residence campus-wise. Our (interesting) findings are summarized in the article below. We thank the student office for supporting us with hostel residence numbers.

The new semester will see many changes in the library. Furniture has arrived and books are already packed to be transferred to the North campus. We hope to see many of you in the new and old, but changed library facilities.

Library Statistics:-

Over the concluding semester, we evaluated the statistics of the library to get a better understanding of users' behavior and needs. The checkout numbers of books and the number of visits to the library at South campus (SC) and the satellite library at North campus (NC) were correlated with hostel resident numbers of BTech, MSc, MS, MTech, and PhD students. Since August 2019, all BTech students are residing on North campus. In turn, most MSc, MS, and MTech students are now living on South campus. PhD students are more evenly distributed over the two campuses. Residence per campus and academic years is given in Figure 1. The total number of book checkouts is given in Figure 2.

Our first comparison concerned the data for the spring semesters of 2018 and 2019. Much to our surprise, the total number of books checked out had declined though the number of students had increased by 19%. The number of books checked out by BTech students went down from 1958 to 1839, while for the same time period the number of BTech students went up by 13.5%. There is no clear explanation for this drop, but the residence on NC which at the time did not have book circulation facilities might be one reason. In the 2018 spring semester only 3rd year BTech students were staying on NC, while in the respective semester in 2019 it was 3rd and 4th year students. For PhD students, the number of book checkouts dropped more dramatically, and during these springs the majority of them was on SC in 2018 and on NC in 2019. However, there may be other explanations like open book exams taken in a big course or not. It may also be that online material is more heavily used in courses and for self study.

Figure 3 contains the average number of checkouts per student for the last four semesters. This includes the last semester which had book circulation on both campuses. The announced service of remote checkout (from NC with collection on the next day) was not used by anyone.

The majority of the most frequent library users stays on South campus where they have to share the 46 seats of the reading room. The ground facts show that this number of seats is not sufficient: at night the class rooms in A5 are used for self and group studies. Regarding NC, it currently has 75 seats in the satellite. With the occupation of the new library building (A16), the ratio of study seats per student residents on NC will further improve as around 100 study seats will be added to the existing 75 seats. But also SC will benefit from this change. Most of the books will shift to NC, so there will be more space for study seats. In the long term, however, it has been recognized that more night study seats for the library on South campus are desirable given that approximately 500 more student residents will occupy the hostels currently under construction.


Most Circulated Books during Jan-Dec 2019 with star Rating




Library Visit Details

Book Review:-



The Liberation of Sita

Author: Volga (Popuri Lalita Kumari); Translators: T. Vijay Kumar and C. Vijayasree Publisher: Harper Perennial, 2016

Volga's *The Liberation of Sita* translated from Telugu is a feminist retelling of the stories of Sita and other female characters of India's oldest and most popular epic *Ramayana*. The winner of Sahitya Akademi Award 2015, this work deviates from the version by Valmiki markedly. The book traces the journey of Sita through various ordeals, that set her off on the path of Self-discovery. She meets other women, who by sharing their experiences with her help her gain strength and wisdom, resulting in her eventual 'liberation'. Volga tries to subvert the main narrative using minor female characters of the epic, who try to escape the shackles of patriarchy

by questioning the notions of beauty, loyalty, motherhood, dharma. This tradition of using mythological characters to share social message has long since existed in Telugu literature as told by the author in an afterword.

The stories are told from Sita's point of view, as she meets these women, who were betrayed by the men in their lives in the name of duty, but remain strong instead of resigning themselves to fate. The four women, Surpanakha, Ahalya, Renuka and Urmila help Sita build a life of her own through their experiences. The interactions between the characters happen in the form of dialogues, where the voices of these minor figures are as important as that of Sita. Each one of these characters help Sita along her journey toward independence and self-assurance. The last chapter shows the internal turmoil of Rama, who is torn between his duty for his state as the ruler and love for Sita. He remains shackled to his responsibilities till the end, whereas Sita gains freedom and control.

The translation appears disjointed and simplistic sometimes, but the author's strong voice is carried over. The characterisation of Rama and the rivalry between Aryans and Dravidians may appear biased, but overall the book provides a compelling alternative reading of India's most loved moral story. Although it received widespread flak when it was published, it delivers a strong message. It is a powerful book for everyone who is familiar with the famous epic, but especially recommended for girls and women who have been conditioned to accept things as they exist, with mythological stories only serving as a guidebook on how to conduct oneself.

JSTOR is a digital library containing digitized issues of academic journals providing full-text access to 12 million academic journal articles, 85,000 books, and 2 million primary source documents in 75 disciplines. It collaborates with the libraries to connect students and faculty to vital content and low-cost access to scholarship, while helping publishers reach out to new authors and audiences. Founded in 1995, JSTOR today provided free or low-cost access to more than 1,500 institutions all around the globe. It strives to work with experts to preserve the original print publications and make them available for future use. Through digitization of printed scholarly journals, it helps participating libraries to free physical space and reduce capital cost associated with storage and access. In 2009, JSTOR merged with ITHAKA, a not-for-profit organization that works to advance and preserve knowledge and improve teaching, learning, and research through the use of digital technologies.
